# Global Development Section Book Award Committee Decision 2018

### Award:

Everyday Sustainability: Gender Justice and Fair Trade Tea in Darjeeling by Debarati Sen, published by SUNY Press

The GDS Book Award Committee is pleased to announce the award winner for 2018: *Everyday Sustainability: Gender Justice and Fair Trade Tea in Darjeeling* by Debarati Sen, published by SUNY Press. Sen's book explores the impact of the fair trade movement on women tea farmers and plantation workers in Darjeeling, India, and by doing so makes a distinguished contribution to global development literature. Her research addresses the important international issue of the efficacy of fair trade and how development sustainability is pursued in the contemporary era, as well as explores the subsidiary questions of how marginalized people use, manipulate, or ignore the international practice of fair trade to continue striving to make their own lives better. The research provides an exceptional analysis of women's wage earnings and the mechanisms women use to counteract the negative effects of the fair trade movement while benefiting from the positive effects. Sen's feminist ethnographic analysis of women's empowerment from both the international and individual levels is exceptional in how it both challenges us to think in new ways about exciting interventions like fair trade, and confronts the continued power disparities between and within societies that endure with such interventions.

You may know that International Political Sociology (IPS) has been under a new Editorial Team as of January 2018! <u>https://academic.oup.com/ips</u>. This is really exciting news for many of us! The new team is "committed to theoretical innovation, the decentering of dominant modes of knowledge production and novel approaches to empirical research. Most importantly, IPS is committed to the geographical and cultural diversification of research beyond the usual circuits of European and North-American scholarship"

The journal invites research papers up to 10,000 words in length that take our understanding of international, transnational and global phenomena out of the comfort zone of familiar approaches. Currently we are particularly interested in receiving papers on new developments in postcolonial and decolonial approaches, questions of transversal

citizenship, innovative analyses of gender relations, the international re-politicisation of inequality, new debates on the Anthropocene, innovative approaches to critical thinking and methods, re-imaginations of security, and critical engagements with practice theory (sour my emphasis).

The CFP is intellectually and politically exciting and is relevant for many of us! If you have / or are working on a research paper along these topics/themes then please do make *IPS* your *first* choice for consideration for publication.

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Expressions of Interest are sought for contributions to a proposed Special Issue of Globalizations on the topic of Critical Development Studies and the Study of Globalizations: Intersections, Fusions and Divergences to be Guest Edited by Professor Paul Bowles (University of Northern British Columbia, Canada) and Professor Henry Veltmeyer (Universidad Autónoma de Zacatecas, Mexico).

We seek to bring together contributions from critical developments studies and invite expressions of interest. Each article is expected to show, firstly, the contribution of critical development studies to the analysis of a particular issue and explain the way(s) in which globalization has been understood and invoked in this analysis. Secondly, each contribution will then explicitly address the ways in which the analysis can be seen as intersecting with, providing an opportunity for fusing with, or diverging from critical approaches to the study of globalization.

Submissions in all areas of CDS are encouraged. These may include submissions on particular themes or on particular geographical areas. The Special Issue will contain approximately ten substantive papers (maximum 8000 words per article).
